VIKINGS PIZZERIA

Vikings Pizzeria, located in Lyons, Ohio, recently celebrated its five-year anniversary. Owned and operated by Evergreen community residents, Nick and Jill Schoendorf, Vikings Pizza has gone from small pizza shop to a full-fledged, seven-day-week restaurant complete with a bar and Keno games. Local photos of student athletes and youth teams adorn the walls, but as one walks through the front door, it is impossible not to notice the wall-sized menu, which includes burgers, wings, salads, quesadillas, bubble teas, and of course, pizza.

Ever wonder what makes the restaurant's most popular list? According to Nick, Friday and Saturday nights are the busiest, in which

100-150 pizzas are created. Carryout is more popular than the eat-in business. Finally, the most requested pies are pepperoni, house supreme, and customer favorite, chicken-bacon-ranch.

In addition to their children, Bailey and Lane, the Schoendorfs employ 20 individuals, the majority are Evergreen High School students or alumni. In fact, currently all four Smithmyer siblings work for Vikings Pizzeria: Liz, Emily, Mike, and Will. "Some people just call the shop the 'Smithmyer-ria'," jokes Nick. Liz Smithmyer is the current manager. "I wouldn't be in business if it wasn't for the Vikings, and my wife who takes care of everything behind the scenes," he said.

Interestingly, as successful as Vikings Pizzeria is, being a pizza shop owner was never on Nick's career path. A graduate of Springfield High School in Holland, Ohio, Nick continued his education at both the fire and police academies. He served seven years as a police officer and 12 years as a fireman. In 2004, he and his wife decided to move out of town, and they built their current home in the Evergreen School District. According to Nick, he was bitten by the entrepreneur bug in 2007; that's when he left the public service profession. After working in the construction field for a few years, he put in an offer on the then for sale Pizza Pit owned by Donna and Jerry Moyer. The offer was accepted, and Vikings Pizzeria was born, refurbished, and expanded for its customers.

Pizza isn't the only entrepreneurial venture Nick has embarked upon in the last decade. He is also co-owner of Pro Air Solutions, a union sheet metal company, established in 2015. Started from the ground up, Pro Air Solutions originated in Lyons and has since moved to its current location in Cleveland.

In addition, many local residents are aware that the Lyons VFW Hall has undergone significant changes. Nick is the new owner of the building and has recently opened the establishment as the Stars and Stripes Saloon. Opened sevendays-a-week beginning at 4:00 pm, the saloon offers a full bar, snack foods, including cheese curds, wings, fried pickles and mozzarella sticks, live music, and more. The menu will soon include burgers and pulled pork sandwiches. According to Nick, the VFW organization will be housed at the location for life, as long as the charter is in effect.

"I enjoy watching this community thrive, and I like making my customers happy," said Nick. "The Evergreen District has welcomed me and my family, and I have met a lot of great people. I look forward to seeing my customers at one of the many Evergreen events."
